fraction of a second when you are taking a picture. Your eye must see a composition or an expression that life itself offers you, and you must know with intuition when to click the camera. That is the moment the photographer is creative," he said. "Oop! The Moment! Once you miss it, it is gone forever.

Think You're Covered?

I've attended a couple of SIG meetings recently where the discussion got around to backing up photos. Some members have some pretty foolproof methods to safeguard their works, which is what I thought I had.

From my working days, I found that backups are only as good as your network guy or systems administrator, even though backups might be stored off-site or in a duplicate computer room in another building. This brings us to the burning question, "so how do you know you're covered?"

Whether you write you own scripts, or use offthe-shelf software to backup your photos to an external drive, you eventually find out how good your scheme is the hard way — when your hard drive crashes. This also applies to documents and spreadsheets, etc. but since this is a photo club, I'll stick to pictures.

My practice has been to do a differential backup every time I work with my digital pictures. That is, new and edited photos that have a file date that is newer than the old backup picture, get written to an external disk. A lot faster than backing up a whole large hard drive.

On occasion, I go back through some of my 30,000 or so digital pictures and hunt for competition contenders, or tweak old photos as I learn new Photoshop techniques. These modified and/ or renamed pictures, of course, get backed up to an external drive. I also weed out photos that weren't so good after all.

Every year I also write my photos to DVD disks. When I started this, it was easy — several years of photos would fit on one DVD. Now, it takes several DVD's to handle one year's worth. The files are larger, and I'm taking a lot more pictures. All this, and I thought I was covered until my hard drive bit the dust.

Next time: the flaws in my backup scheme.
