SMART TELESCOPES—ASTROPHOTOGRAPHY MADE EASY

FEBRUARY PRESENTATION BY GUY TURENNE

ARDETH CARLSON, PROGRAM CHAIR

Join us at the February meeting for a fascinating presentation by LPS member Guy Turenne on shooting the galaxies! In his presentation, Guy will briefly talk about smart telescopes in general, as they have only been around for a few years, and then go into his Seestar S50 telescope in some detail. He will also talk briefly about what can be photographed and some of the problems involved in the actual use of the Seestar and what can be done to a Seestar image in post processing. He will also include some of his Seestar images. This part of Guy's presentation during the meeting can be viewed online via our Zoom connection. If weather permits, Guy can give a practical demonstration outside following the presentation, expecting that to probably last 15 to 20 minutes. Unfortunately, that would not be viewable by those online, so we encourage you to attend in person if possible.

Guy's profile:

"I am originally from Massachusetts. I attended Virginia Tech, receiving a B.S. in Forest Management in 1973. I spent my career as an urban forester primarily with Montgomery County, Maryland, a suburb of Washington D. C., retiring in 2006. Roxanne retired from teaching at the same time, and we moved to Fort Collins the same year. I have been a member of the Fort Collins Digital Camera Club for 18 years and joined LPS in 2010. I am primarily a wildlife and nature photographer. Over the years here in Colorado, I have had photographs exhibited in photography shows in Fort Collins, Greeley, Denver, and Parker. I have received several ribbons from PSA interclub competitions. I have also been a volunteer photographer for Larimer County Parks for four years, with photos appearing in some of their publications.


"My interest in astrophotography began with my first telescope purchased in 1986 for Comet Halley.

Unfortunately, Comet Halley was barely visible through the night sky light pollution of the Washington D.C. metro area. I did manage to photograph a couple of lunar eclipses while living in D.C. I could not go much beyond that, as the financial commitment to what was needed at the time for serious astrophotography was beyond my budget. My astrophotography interest remained relatively nascent until I came across smart telescopes in late 2024. Since getting my Seestar S50, I have been continually amazed at what can be done with this relatively inexpensive device."

The meeting will be held at our usual venue in the Trinity United Methodist Church, 801 Cleveland Avenue, Loveland, in the lower level. Come for a social time at 6:00 PM; the meeting begins at 6:30 with any business, followed by the competition results slideshow and Guy's presentation.

MEMBER PROFILE

Tim Kathka

Growing up in Columbus, Nebraska, I knew at a young age that I wanted to be an architect or urban planner. I attended the University of Nebraska and was awarded an opportunity to work and travel in Europe during the summer of 1967. My grandfather gifted me a basic Yashica point-and-shoot camera with which to record my travels throughout that summer, shooting with Ektachrome slide film. I graduated with a Bachelor of Architecture degree in 1968. While photography has been an interest of mine since that initial adventure in Europe and a couple years later, when I was taught the basics by a pair of Navy shipmates, that interest always took a back seat to my family and career in the practice of architecture.

Reaching retirement age, I have found more time to travel and to enjoy photography. I stayed active in the Naval Reserve for 25 years after my active duty, which presented many of my opportunities for travel. While the Navy presented the opportunity to learn about photography and for travel, my career in architecture focused my interest in subject matter toward urban street scenes and architecture. I have expanded my photo subject matter to include all landscape, wildlife focused on birds and, more recently, astrophotography. My astrophotography interest is centered on shooting landscape or architecture in the middle of the night, with such subjects being placed as foreground for the Milky Way.

For planning a shoot, I primarily use the PlanIt app on my phone, supplemented with PhotoPills, ClearDarkSkies.com, and local weather forecasts. I also try to research locations with daytime road trips, in search of interesting landforms or old buildings away from urban lights. A friend and I



were featured in a Milky Way article in the May/June edition of the Colorado Life magazine.

Digital photography and computerized photo processing (primarily Lightroom) has brought an enjoyment that I remember seeing my Navy buddies have as they worked their magic in the darkroom years ago. Because I view photography as a form of art, I will sometimes use computer processing of my images to create a certain effect for which I am looking, much like the darkroom was used to create certain effects on film.

My wife and I settled in Colorado after my stint in the active Navy and lived in Centennial for 46 years, before moving to Good Samaritan Loveland Village in the middle of the Covid outbreak, July 2020. My wife passed away in September 2022, forcing me to learn how to live without my lifelong love and companion.

I was twice named Photographer of the Year by the Englewood Camera Club, where I am still active. I served on the Program Committee here at LPS for three years and have now become your Treasurer and Membership Chair. I also currently serve as the membership chair for an association of retired Navy intelligence professionals, as president of the Good Samaritan Model RR Committee, and a member of the Northern Colorado Garden Railroaders. I play bridge twice a week with a men's bridge group. I still love to travel and will be in Scottsdale for two months when this newsletter is published.



Learning From Images on LPS.CC

The new year is always a good time to look back and review what went well and what we can improve on in the coming year. This applies to your images as a photographer, as well. The lps.cc website is a great place to review your images and learn from others. To see your images on lps.cc, on the Home page go to **My Account**, then **My Image Library**.




Click on “Display all images” and you get a nice table of all the images you’ve submitted to an LPS competition or Third Monday Photo Review. It also includes a thumbnail of the image, the title, the score the image received (if applicable), and the date you uploaded it into lps.cc. This table is sorted by the title of the image.




If you’ve been submitting a lot of images to LPS, this can be a big table, spread across multiple pages on the website. In the image shown here, it’s displaying 10 images per web page, and there are over 10 pages of images. You can change the page size to have fewer pages, but if we want to go back and review our images from the past year and see those that got a score in a competition (not a Third Monday review image), manually going through that table is a lot of work! **Image Search** to the rescue!



Clicking on “Image Search” allows you to narrow down the results. Near the bottom of the Image Search page are fields for awards or scores and the “age” of the image. This shows in number of days how long since it’s been uploaded to the LPS system. So in this example, let’s set the minimum score to 15 and the Catalog Age to 365 days. This will show me all the images I submitted to competitions at LPS that got a score of 15 or above and was submitted in the last year. Nice! Take a look at the images that scored well and those that did not. What can you learn from them?



There is a limitation to the Image Library, though. It cannot be sorted, and it cannot be exported to Excel or another spreadsheet. If you’d like to review and sort your data in a spreadsheet, **My Account**, then **Image History** is where to go.



The default information view of Image History is similar to Image Library, except it does not contain a thumbnail of the image. It does contain all of the information associated with the image, and it’s in a table format. In the upper right-hand corner of the table are the buttons to export that data to the Excel format or as a CSV file.

After exporting the file and opening it in your spreadsheet program, you can sort, filter, etc., to your heart's content. There are 16 columns (not all shown here) of information.




Okay, you've seen your images from the past, seen the scores they received, and learned something about what others like in your images by looking at the judge critiques. What if you'd like to learn from what others have done? You can easily review all the images from any competition, including the judges' comments (if any) on lps.cc. Seeing what others have done, which scored well, which images speak to you, can provide additional inspiration for your own work. To get there, click on **Competitions**, then **Competition Results**.

In the list of the competitions, choose the date and competition category you'd like to see by clicking the "Select" button to the left of that competition. This will show the competition results for the competition you selected. Note: This page defaults to only showing those images that received a Best of Show or Award of Merit award. To see all the images entered into that competition, click the box next to "Display all images." If there were comments made by any of the judges, a "Display Critiques" button shows beneath the image. Click on that button to see what impressions the judges had of the image.

Now you've got the information. Time to make some New Year's photographic resolutions!!

Monochrome Category

The rotating category for our February competition is Monochrome. LPS is using the definition of Monochrome from the Photographic Society of America, which consists of the following:

An image is considered to be Monochrome only if it gives the impression of having no color (i.e. contains only shades of grey which can include pure black and pure white) OR it gives the impression of being a greyscale image that has been toned in one color across the entire image (for example, by sepia, red, gold, etc.). A greyscale or multi-colored image modified or giving the impression of having been modified by partial toning, multi-toning or by the inclusion of spot coloring does not meet the definition of monochrome and shall be classified as a Color Work.

For the LPS competition, this is not a realism category, so creativity is allowed. Avoid using spot color, and be careful that when converting a color photograph to B&W you do not allow any color tones to remain. This is different from other design definitions of monochrome in which an image or scene contains all blue or other single-color elements, for instance, along with white, black, beige, etc.

Here is an example on the left of a photograph toned in one color across the entire image, which is an acceptable submission in monochrome. The other two photos are not acceptable; the middle one has some color on the pelican beak, and the right photo is not a single color across the entire image.

Monthly Topic: Patterns & Repetitions

ROB HUFFSMITH, COMPETITION CHAIR

In photography, repetition uses repeated visual elements (lines, shapes, colors, textures) to create rhythm, while a pattern is a structured, predictable repetition, like a grid or sequence, that unifies an image and draws the eye. Photographers use repetition to build impact, either by filling the frame to emphasize the pattern (like bricks on a wall) or by capturing the break in a pattern for emphasis, often making it the main subject. For this competition, the patterns and repetitions need to be from the real world and not created digitally. It is not required that they fill the frame, so composition will have a play on the impact.

LPS General Competition Rules

All images used in competition must be the property of the member and must be photographs or combinations of photographs that were taken by the member. Other photographic material from other sources is not permitted to be used unless specified in a monthly or other special topic.

1. The photographic image may not be a reproduction of another artist's work. The image entered must be the photographer's original work. If another work of art is visible in the photograph, it cannot be the central theme or message of the photograph. If the judges determine the artwork is the central theme, the image will be scored accordingly.
2. All images must begin with a photograph. They may not be totally computer generated.
3. Members may only enter in one level.
4. Images may only be entered once in a given year (except for the year-end competition where they must be entered in the same level and category as originally entered). Images that don't earn an award may be entered again the following year. Images that win any award may not be entered again.
5. Promotions to higher levels are based on a member's average score for their last 9 images during the past 12 months. If a member has less than 9 entries in the past year, their average score calculation will be padded with zeros. A member cannot win an award unless they have at least 9 entries in the past year. Competition level limits will be adjusted each year to avoid having everyone grouped into the same one or two levels.
6. There are five competition levels with 1 being the starting group and 5 being the highest score averages group.
7. All members will start out at Level 1, and they can only move up to another level once they have submitted a minimum of 9 images to competitions in the past 12 months.
8. Student members may only enter at Level 1.

9. By entering images in a Loveland Photographic Society competition the photographer gives Loveland Photographic Society non-exclusive right to use the image for purposes related to promotion of the Loveland Photographic Society and for benefit of the members. For example: these images may be used in slide shows or other presentations to the members and to outside parties for the purpose of promoting the Loveland Photographic Society.

LPS Judge Qualifications

LPS competitions are judged by a panel of three people who meet the qualifications to critique photos in a knowledgeable manner. This means that judges should have significant experience as a photographer and some familiarity with a variety of photographic genres and/or experience as a photography judge.

It is important for judges to have a good understanding of the elements that comprise a well composed photograph, the ability to recognize aspects of an image that could be improved, and the ability to explain their critiques.

While the judges are most often members of LPS, it is also acceptable to use the services of non-member judges. LPS judges generally critique and score between 50 to 75 photos between Tuesday morning and Thursday at midnight the week before the meeting and need to be available to help break any ties for BOS.

Final determination whether prospective judges meet the required skill set is within the authority of the Competition Chair. Judges who meet the qualifications must go through training that is specific to our club competitions.

LPS Membership

Although LPS welcomes guests to our monthly club meetings, there are benefits to joining as a member.

If you like to see how your images fare in competition, you can submit up to 3 photos each month in our club competitions. You also have the opportunity to have an image submitted in the three rounds of Photographic Society of America Worldwide interclub competitions.

The club is a great place to meet other photographers, get critiques and comments at the Third Monday Photo Review sessions, find photo-op events and activities, and have access to the recordings of meeting presentations. You might enjoy initiating meet & shoots or participating in field trips with other members. As a member, the InFocus newsletter is automatically emailed to you each month.

LPS annual dues are \$45 per individual, \$60 per couple. This goes toward our meeting venue, LPS website, Zoom administration, and other fees and expenses.

Your membership dues also fund our annual Youth Showcase, a competition for high-schoolers in the Northern Colorado area to encourage their continued interest in photographic pursuits. Prizes are given for the LPS competition, and images with high scores are also entered in the Youth Showcase competition of the Photographic Society of America, which gives the young photographers visibility nationally and even internationally.

Dues are payable through the website under **Membership>Join or Renew** or by check sent to the postal address on page 3 of the newsletter.

Competition Corner

Submitting Pictures for Competition or the Photo Review Session

- Log on to the LPS website
- Mouse over the **Competitions** dropdown on the Home Page.
- Select **Submit images to a Competition**
- Select the Competition category or the Third Monday Photo Review
- At the bottom of the screen, click on **Upload images into the Competition.**
- Then click on the button **Select** which will open a window on your computer to select an image.
- Click on **Save Images and Proceed to Edit Page.**
- Type in a title and click on **Save any changes and return to original page.**
- You can replace any photo, up to the submission deadline, if desired.
- A photo may only be submitted once in the current year except for the "Best Of" category in December. If it has won an award, it should not be submitted in competition again in future years.

The monthly competitions allow a single image per category. The photo review session allows up to three images.

Please keep the judging criteria in mind:

Impact—Impact is the nebulous quality of an emotional response to an image. This subjective aspect of judging should not preempt the composition or technical quality aspects.

Composition—Good composition is a pleasing arrangement of the elements in an image. There are many guidelines for good composition that judges may consider.

Technical Quality—This includes sharpness, focus, color, tonal scale, contrast, appropriate depth of field and other qualities. Consideration is also given for the effect the photographer was trying to achieve such as high key, multiple exposure, or selective focus.

Monthly Topics—The subject matter should be related in some manner to the topic. While there are no formal deductions or penalties, judges may reduce their overall score if they feel the image does not align with the monthly topic. With that said, creative interpretation is encouraged, except in categories with specific rules such as monochrome.

Open Projected—The image must begin as a photograph. From there, it is up to you. Any photograph may be entered in the Open Projected category.

Participation in a group is determined by the average of the member's 9 previous LPS competition image scores. Here are the groups for the February competition:

All other members will compete in Group 1 until the member has 9 submitted images *within a 12-month period* that reach an averaged score for a different group. An individual member's competition group might vary from month to month.

Best of Show and Award of Merit will be given in Groups 2-5, and those photos will be published in the LPS InFocus newsletter. In order to receive an award for a competition, an image must receive a score of 18 or above.



PSA Competition Definitions

Because LPS, as a member club of PSA, participates in interclub competitions, we use the PSA definitions for those LPS competition categories.

In the Nature Division, the PSA definitions are more restrictive than, for instance, North American Nature Photography Association competitions. In PSA nature competitions, higher scores are given to images in which there is a strong active story; thus, portraits and closeups are not apt to do as well. Images should also not be highly stylized but should represent an image that is true to real life. PSA has **updated their rules** about excepting evidence of human-caused elements, specifically such as the following update:

...b) When they are a small but unavoidable part of the scene, such as an unobtrusive footprint or track in the background.

Photojournalism images should include informative content and emotional impact and reflect human presence. In a specific category of Human Interest, the photo should include people or a person. Because storytelling is an important part of PSA photojournalism, the photo should not be a studio-type portrait, and people engaged in activities will probably receive a higher score. The activities depicted should not involve something specifically arranged for photographers.

In the Travel Division, images should show elements of an identifiable geographic area or culture. Photos that are simply taken while the photographer is traveling do not necessarily comply with that rule. Thus, a general photo of a forest without a feature showing an identifiable area of the world would not be acceptable.

If the image predominantly or exclusively depicts a place, such as land-, sea- or cityscape, or a physical structure such as a building or monument, it must include characteristic and distinctive physical features. It is not necessary that the image identify the exact location.

Submitting Interclub Photos

The LPS reps are currently collecting photos for Rounds 2 and 3 of the 2025-2026 interclub competition. Participating clubs in the Nature, Photojournalism, and Travel Divisions may submit up to 6 photos, by 6 different photographers, in each round. In the Pictorial Print Division, the club may submit 4 images in each of the 5 categories.

PSA requires a signed release by each photographer whose photos are entered in the competition. The release is valid for three years, and the reps are responsible to collect and keep on file the signed releases from LPS members. This simply allows PSA to publish your photos in the PSA Journal and to display them on the PSA website if you win an award. If you have photos you would like to be considered or questions, email the listed LPS rep.

Reasons to Join PSA

An individual membership in the Photographic Society of America is an excellent bargain for photographers seeking to improve their photography skills. PSA offers free online photography courses, study groups, mentorships, and the opportunity to compete individually in PSA competitions.

Online image dialogue groups on various topics are open to all PSA members, in which participants in groups of 6-7 submit a photo once a month, and other members offer comments, critiques, and suggested edits.

In addition, the monthly PSA Journal is available online for download. This is a beautiful publication with a lot of information about photography locations and ideas for different photo genres plus discussion on relevant topics about photography.

The annual PSA Photo Festival is a great way to meet photographers from all over the U.S. in addition to members from other countries. The program presenters are topnotch, and the tours provide fun field trip experiences.

Ruth Sprain Receives PSA Service Award

Board member Ruth Sprain has been serving as the organizer of the LPS Youth Showcase for many years and in 2025 was recognized by the Photographic Society of America Worldwide for her work in promoting interest in photography by northern Colorado area students. J.R. Schnelzer wrote the following in recommending Ruth for this prestigious award:

"I have known Ruth for over a decade. She is an active member of the Loveland Photographic Society (LPS) and has been a PSA member since 2014. After serving on the LPS Youth Showcase Committee for two years, she accepted the Scholarship Chair position and has tirelessly worked to sustain this program for the past 11 years.

"The LPS Youth Showcase requires about a seven-month time commitment from Ruth and her committee, spanning from October to April. Ruth is an excellent communicator and organizer, and the team contacts art and photography teachers at local high schools to distribute applications to student photographers. Photos are collected well before the deadline, allowing ample time for organizing and judging.

"Ruth coordinates the judging process with three local judges, and the top winners in each category receive ribbons and gift cards. The judges select the 'Best Senior,' who is personally invited, along with their family, to a club meeting where they are congratulated and presented with a \$250 check sponsored by LPS.

"Committee members enjoy working with Ruth, and many have been on the team for years. When one of our committee members could no longer collect photos from Denver area schools due to health reasons, Ruth successfully expanded the number of schools in northern Colorado.

"Thanks to Ruth's commitment to the Youth Showcase, LPS has been able to support the PSA Youth Showcase by sending winning prints and digital images to PSA to compete against

other high school photographers. Year after year, many of our local students have their work on display in the Print Gallery at the annual PSA Photo Festival. I wholeheartedly recommend Ruth for a PSA Service Award."


Ruth's PSA Service Award was announced last September in Portland, Oregon, at the annual Photo Festival of PSA.

Third Monday Photo Review

An excellent way to get feedback on your photos and for experienced photographers to share their knowledge is to participate in the Monday photo review sessions via Zoom on the third Monday of each month. Participants are allowed to submit three photos no later than noon of the session day.

The review is mentored by Mike Wilcox, who welcomes and encourages comments and suggestions by all participants. Many members have reported that they have received a greater knowledge of photo techniques and also found it helpful to see their photos in the eyes of other photographers. Because judges of the monthly competition often do not have time to offer critiques on all of the competition photos, the Third Monday Photo Review provides that helpful aspect of improving our craft.

Zoom Meeting Attendance Guidelines

LPS is happy to provide an opportunity for members to attend meetings online through Zoom streaming. However, sometimes online attendees forget to turn off the microphone and camera on their own devices; that means everyone watching the presentation can watch you eating, staring, talking to someone else, the hijinks of your cat/dog, and what's going on in your room, and we can hear your phone, your TV, your roommate, your cat/dog...!

When you log into the meeting, please automatically click on the microphone icon and the camera icon so that a red line appears over those indicating they are off. Now you can watch the presentation without everyone also watching you.

Submitting Third Monday Review Photos Into Competition

Several members have noted that they are having difficulty with entering a photo in a monthly competition that has previously been submitted to the Third Monday Review. To do that, the competition image must be selected from your Image Library on the LPS website, not uploaded again from your computer. If you have made changes to your Third Monday photo and want to enter that in the competition, which is allowable, you need to delete the first image from your Image Library before submitting the updated photo in the competition.
