Sharing his passion with others that wanted to learn, inspired him to teach others, and he has been teaching photography workshops for over seven years. David finds satisfaction in watching his students grow in their photographic journey. David is also the author of "Nightscape: The complete guide to photographing under the night sky." His work is featured in various publications and his night photography is on display at the Royal Observatory Greenwich in London, England. He will show you how to use "Slow Shutter" app for the iPhone or the manual camera controls on your Android or Google phones. He will demonstrate how he creates colorful and unique abstracts and then turn you loose to create your own abstracts.

For the last 30 minutes of this Walk-About, Jeff will share how he edits and enhances his abstracts in Snapseed (phone & tablet) and in Lightroom and Photoshop on your computers. So many cool ideas to use these images for. You'll have to

come along to find out how to make these crazy and just plain fun photographs! It's only \$35 so why not come and see for yourself.

This workshop is designed as a comfortable and informal event so everyone has a chance to shoot, ask questions and learn. All skill levels are welcome and encouraged to attend these events. It's contagious . . . Addictive . . . and just plain fun!

Bad Weather, Good Weather . . . for Photographers

One of the best light conditions for photographers is the light produced by bad weather. In fact, it is the basis for original and dramatic photographs especially when unusual weather conditions produce spectacular cloud formations.

The single nicest thing about overcast sky is that it almost always gives perfectly diffused light, which is not only ideal for people portraits, but flowers, objects and landscape photography.

On rainy days or after the rain, colors are more brilliant because they reflect intensity of light. Besides, rain cleans the atmosphere and everything looks fresher. Puddles left after rain reflect everything in the surrounding area and can offer interesting compositions. If the weather is drizzly it is possible to make nostalgic scenes.


The mist and fog should not be a deterrent to photographers. In this atmospheric condition it is possible to create an almost monochromatic picture that shows a strange eerie quality.

There are many other possibilities that the bad weather offers to make remarkable photos, such as rainbows, wind, storms, lightning and other atmospheric conditions. Do not let the weather conditions prevent photography — be prepared to go out when bad weather is coming: the result could be surprising.

Caution: bad weather can be dangerous and safety precautions should be taken before











lightning. A rain coat and water proof shoes are a must, especially to avoid catching a cold.

Remember, that the temperature can change drastically especially in the mountains.

Sharon, my loving wife of 55 years has been called upon to drive more hours while on the road



Please keep the judging criteria in mind:

Impact and Viewer Interest — "Wow" factor is the nebulous quality where an image "pops". This subjective aspect of judging should not preempt the technical or composition aspects of an image.

Composition — Good composition is a pleasing arrangement of the elements in an image. There are many guidelines for good composition that judges may consider.

Technical Quality — This includes sharpness, focus, color, tonal scale, contrast, appropriate depth of field and other qualities. Consideration is also given for the effect the photographer was trying to achieve such as high key, multiple exposure, selective focus, etc.

Monthly Themes — The subject matter should be related in some manner to the theme. While there are no formal "deductions" or penalties, judges may reduce their overall score if they feel the image does not align with monthly theme. With that said, creative interpretation is encouraged.

Errata



In the last newsletter, I reported how Photoshop displays a slider to adjust temperature plus or minus going from zero, but doesn't show the real temperature — wrong! Well, half wrong. Photoshop does show the actual temperature of raw images, but the photos discussed in the article were jpg's. Even in the Lightroom develop module, jpg images just show a slider going from zero in either direction. May be another reason to listen to the experts, and shoot raw.



Uploading Images to a Competition

If you are having problems getting an image to upload to the website there are a few things you can check to make sure you file complies with the requirements:

- Image type raw won't work
- Image size must be less than 4 MB
- Image filename not more than 32 characters in length
- No special characters in filename not even a hyphen, and certainly no symbols
- No duplicates it won't upload if that filename already exists in the system
- Case might matter all caps vs. caps and lower case, etc.

Sometimes weird things happen, so try again if it doesn't work the first time. For more information, watch the video that's available on screen.
