

Photographing Wildflowers

The procedure for taking wildflowers pictures is almost the same as taking people's portraiture. The idea is to make a memorable picture that reveals the "character" of the subject. Below are some simple tips.

The Background plays a vital role to a portrait. A good background will help to draw attention to

your subject. Take your time to find a flower with a good background and having no distracting elements that blurred or dimmed the focus.

Search a flower that is in good shape. Check that there are not missing petals or color faded or there are small insects.

Light. Best wildflowers portraits are those taken in natural light. Avoid direct sun light on the subject. Light diffuser can help.

Lens aperture. It is important to isolate the flower against the background to draw attention to the flower. Wide open aperture will blur the background but may affect part of the blossom. In general f/5.6 or f/8 is good.

Shutter speed. The wind is your enemy when photographic wildflowers. A shutter speed of 1/200 is the best to capture for unsteady subject. Consider the adjustment of your ISO with the best lens aperture.

Focus. It is vital to keep the subject as sharp as possible in focus.

Whenever it is possible include a line leading the eye to the wildflowers helping the composition design.


It is sometimes important to include the leaves in the picture because many wildflowers are almost identical but they are different species and adding the leaves helps identifying it.

Angle. Play with angles to find a perfect look for your subject. Try to find as much as possible a contrast between your subject and the background to create a pleasing depth and a photo with clarity.

Aesthetically, odd number of flowers blossom, like 1, 3 and 5 is more pleasing in beauty appearance.

Knowing the name of the wildflower you are photographing will expand the appreciation of the subject

Finally. All of the above does not matter if the composition doesn't not give a lasting impression.



One tool in your camera that can help you make quickly a good composition is by turning on the Rule of Thirds grid that many camera have. By placing the main blossom in any of the four intersections of the lines will helps to accentuate it. It is not necessary to be exact, but use these guide helps composing a picture. Please, avoid the subject in the middle of the picture if you have room to move around.

When photographing wildflowers, it's also important to leave no trace. That means, be careful not to step on the flowers, or disturb the ground around them . Many flowers depend on the soil structure around them.

Astrophotography Opportunity

Hi Everyone!

I'd like to invite you all to attend an evening of astrophotography! I will make my telescope (Celestron 9.25" Schmidt-Cassegrain on an Orion Atlas mount) available for members of the club to use. I will also bring a tripod tracking mount (iOptron) for wide-field photos. Any other members of the club who have astrophotography gear are invited to bring it and share.

When: Saturday, August 6, beginning at dusk.

Where: Baker Draw Designated Shooting Range in the Pawnee Grasslands. http://www.fs.usda.gov/Internet/FSE_DOCUMENTS/stelprd3793663.pdf

There is a restroom and plenty of parking at the facility. To get there, drive east on CO14 from I-25 for about 30 minutes, Then turn left onto CR61. After about 3 miles, turn right onto CR96. The shooting range will be about 1.1 miles down on the left - just past the CR63 intersection.

What we will be shooting: The moon will be up until 10PM and Jupiter will be very close to the moon (a conjunction), making for a good photo opportunity. After that we'll have other planets and the summer milky way deep space targets to shoot. We'll probably focus on the Lagoon and Trifid nebulae.

Bring a folding chair, plenty of warm clothes and layers, binoculars if you have them, and some food and beverages. Bring your camera and a few lenses, a remote shutter, and a tripod of you have one. Lenses with large apertures are best. We will set up the telescope at dark, and will stay until everyone has had a chance for a photo using the telescope. There are two ways to shoot using the

telescope. The first is piggyback. This is when you mount your camera and lens on top of the telescope. The telescope is used for tracking and guiding. This technique works well for wide angle lenses all the way up to supertelephoto lenses. The gear can handle up to about 12 pounds. The second method is to connect directly to the telescope. For this we'll need a T-mount, which cost about \$11 and can be ordered online. I have a Cannon T-mount and JR has a Nikon T-mount. If you shoot a different kind of camera you would have to purchase a T-mount that will fit your camera and my scope (Celestron 9.25"). Contact me if you are interested and we'll work together on this.

Keep in mind that we'll have to count on good weather, or the trip will have to be postponed. For this event good weather means no clouds, haze or wind.

I hope you all can make it!

Bryan Peterson Photography Seminar and Field Experience

Bryan began by explaining that there are at least six correct exposures for any photograph although each of them will yield different results. He went on to talk about depth of field, the sunny 16 rule, where to meter, filters, and information on flash photography.

The elements of design were also covered as well as composition. The all-day event included many examples as displayed on large screens. Participants also had the opportunity to purchase autographed copies of Bryan's books on photography.

A field experience with Bryan was offered on the second day for a limited number. The participants car pooled around rural areas, the junk yard, and northern Colorado seeking photo ops, which turned out to be another full day of activity.
