Submitting Pictures for the Monthly Competition or Photo Review Session

- Log on to the LPS website
- Mouse over the Competitions dropdown on the Home Page.
- · Select menu item:

Submit images to a Competition

- Select the Competition category or the Third Monday Photo Review
- At the bottom of the screen, click on **Upload images into the Competition.**
- Then click on the button Select which will open a window on your computer to select an image.
- Click on Save Images and Proceed to Edit Page.
- Type in a title and click on Save any changes and return to original page.
- You can replace any photo, up to the submission deadline, if desired.

The monthly competitions allow a single image per category. The photo review session allows up to three images. Include your last name in the title; this will allow us to limit the number of images if it is necessary.

From Padma:

Since I live just an hour away from NYC, when I first got my camera, after I got through all the flowers in my garden, I started exploring how to capture the beauty of the world's greatest and most distinguished skyline. Volunteers are still needed to assume the duties of webmaster and treasurer/ membership chairperson,

It cannot be stressed enough how vital these positions are to the continued operation of our club. Certainly we must have a treasurer to handle our finances and someone responsible for keeping track of new member activation and membership updates.

Take a look at the list of webmaster duties and you can see what will happen without a website administrator, including no website which means no competition submissions or judging, no posting of competition photos, and no newsletter.

Duties of the Treasurer/ Membership Chair

Because there is so much overlap, the positions of treasurer and membership chair go together and should be assumed by one person. The treasurer has to deal with all money matters, income and expenses, which are all directly related to membership (new members and renewals). The total time invested per week averages 2-4 hours (or 8-16 hours per month). It's a lot of small details, but all are simple to do.

Treasurer

Duties include managing both bank accounts (checking and savings), balancing said accounts, paying bills for the club via debit card and checks, maintaining/storing all financial documents for seven years (it all fits into just one bin), transferring money from PayPal to our bank accounts each month,

creating/maintaining a spreadsheet and generating bi-monthly (every two months) financial reports for board meetings, and going to the post office at least once per month (more often is better) to sort the mail, collect checks for member renewals, and pick up some bills.

Part of the treasurer's duties are to oversee all banking changes. When we get a new president, secretary, or treasurer, the treasurer must generate specific documents in a specific format to inform the bank of the changes being made.

Another duty is to keep up with our affiliates and maintain any documentation/records they require to keep our affiliation status.

Membership

Duties include activating new member accounts and sending them a greeting and notification of membership activation. New members are not activated until money is received. The same holds true for renewing members, i.e. updates are made only after money is received. This requires some simple record keeping.

Also, when we meet in person, I will make a name tag for each new member. Name tags also can be made of veteran members who have lost theirs.

Occasionally the membership list needs updating by deleting people who are no longer members. If their account has been expired and inactive for 18 months or longer, I delete the account for financial reasons.

Sandy will be available to help the new treasurer/membership chair learn the ropes.

Webmaster Duties

The web administrator position takes 1-2 hours per month on average. I've maintained a notebook in PDF form that serves as a cheat sheet, with instructions on how to find your way around the website and how to handle routine items. Visual Pursuits, the authors of the LPS Website, also has built-in help covering their administrator tools.

These are the main webmaster duties:

- Upload newsletter and newsletter page
- Update competition results once a month
- Update web pages as needed, usually once per year
- Update email forwarding list, usually once per year
- Work with treasurer to pay annual fees
- Update roles for new board members

Along with the cheat sheet, I will pass along the following items:

- Excel spreadsheet outlining the roles assigned to board members.
- Excel spreadsheet covering the newsletter index
- Perl scripts that convert the competition results and newsletter index to HTML code; this can be done in the Visual Pursuits editor, but the old hacker in me wants to edit in HTML.

Familiarity with HTML and Perl scripts would be helpful but not necessary.

Bill will be available to help the new administrator.

Monthly Topic: In Motion

Submission Deadline

Before Midnight, Monday, July 4

Please keep the judging criteria in mind:

Impact and Viewer Interest—"Wow" factor is the nebulous quality where an image "pops." This subjective aspect of judging should not preempt the technical or composition aspects of an image.

Composition—Good composition is a pleasing arrangement of the elements in an image. There are many guidelines for good composition that judges may consider.

Technical Quality—This includes sharpness, focus, color, tonal scale, contrast, appropriate depth of field and other qualities. Consideration is also given for the effect the photographer was trying to achieve such as high key, multiple exposure, or selective focus.

Monthly Topics—The subject matter should be related in some manner to the topic. While there are no formal deductions or penalties, judges may reduce their overall score if they feel the image does not align with the monthly topic. With that said, creative interpretation is encouraged.

Open Projected—The image must begin as a photograph. From there, it is up to you. Any photograph may be entered in the Open Projected category.

Travel Category

A Photo Travel image expresses the **characteristic features or culture of a land** as they are found naturally. In the case of landscapes or buildings, it is not necessary to know "where the place is." The image only needs to have **identifiable features** so that the place can be recognized by someone visiting it.

Close-up pictures of people or objects must include features that **provide information about the location.** This means that the photo should not be only a portrait of a person or persons, even if that person is dressed in some type of native garb.

The **only allowable adjustments** are removal of dust or digital noise, restoration of the appearance of the original scene, and complete conversion to greyscale monochrome (no spot or selective color). Other derivations, including infrared, are not permitted. Techniques that add, relocate, replace or remove any element of the original image, except by cropping, are not permitted.

All images must look natural. Oversaturated, overly sharpened, and other images with unnatural artifacts, such as halos or strong vignetting, should be given lower scores in judging. Extreme fish-eye images that are distorted do not appear natural. Partial desaturation of areas of the image does not look natural and is not allowed.



He combines his background in painting with traditional and alternative photographic processes using state-of-the-art digital technology. His work is about the perception of nature and the nature of perception. His art has been exhibited internationally and purchased by numerous private and public collections including Princeton University, the Estée Lauder collection, and the Smithsonian.

In his presentation at the photo festival, he will explore ways of developing a personal vision and style. He will discuss the difference between angle of view and point of view. Different storytelling structures will be compared and contrasted, giving you more skills to work with.

Scott Wilson will be the evening speaker on Wednesday evening, and Lisa Langell will be speaking on Thursday evening. Both are familiar to LPS members, having made presentations to our club previously.

Car Break-in Alert

Recently the wife of LPS member Don Reilly parked in a well-used lot on the west side of Fossil Creek park in Ft. Collins in the early afternoon on a week day to walk the dog. There were other vehicles in the lot. Before she got back to the car, she was getting a phone notice from her credit card company asking if she had made a \$1015 purchase at a nearby King Soopers.

When she reached the car, one window was heavily damaged, a second window completely disintegrated, and her purse that had been covered up in the passenger floor well was gone. Two card purchases had been made within just a few minutes; a third had been foiled because of the card company's responsiveness. In addition to the credit cards, bank debit card, and some cash, her wallet was taken, which had lots of family photos and mementos.

Clearly these thieves were professional and were probably lurking in that lot, hitting the car very shortly after she and the dog walked away from the car. The auto glass repairman said thieves use the type of device intended for breaking out of a car if trapped inside; it's extremely effective and makes virtually no noise, thereby not attracting attention from others nearby as they break in. These deviates work silently and are well aware of how to act quickly, in order to make credit cards usable.

A local policeman's wife mentioned to Don that in this area there has been significant increase in vehicle thefts as of late. Be careful where you park and what you leave inside, even if it's not visible from the exterior. It is more important than ever to be aware of surroundings and people whenever exiting your car anywhere. Avoid or move on if people are hanging out in parked vehicles in the area.

NoCo July 4th Celebrations

Loveland's annual July 4 celebration at North Lake Park includes a children's bike parade at 3:30 p.m., a cornhole tournament at 4:00, live music beginning at 3:00 at Hammond Amphitheater, and a beer garden from 3:00—8:00. Fireworks will begin shooting over the lake at 9:17.

Fireworks will also take place at 6–9:30 p.m. at The Ranch Events Complex. Gates at the south entrance will open for vehicle entry (free) at 6:00. Onsite snack trucks will be available, and patriotic music will be played by Big Rob on local radio station 96.1 KISS FM. Viewers are asked to remain either in or adjacent to their vehicles (except to use toilet facilities or grab snacks).

The city of Fort Collins will hold several daytime events to celebrate the Fourth of July, including a hot air balloon launch. Weather permitting, balloons will launch at 6 a.m. from Twin Silo, Soft Gold and Edora parks. At noon, trolley rides take off at the City Park depot, heading in the direction of Old Town; the vintage Birney Car 21 is available until 5:00 for all visitors wanting to take a ride around Fort Collins. A live music concert begins at 3:00. There will also be a food truck rally. The fireworks display at around 9:40 takes place over Sheldon Lake near City Park.

Windsor's annual Fourth of July celebration will be centered at Windsor Lake at Boardwalk Park. Fireworks will launch shortly after 9:15, weather permitting. Tents and other structures are not permitted; park visitors can bring picnic baskets, lawn chairs, and blankets.

The Greeley Stampede will conclude with a fireworks show at about 9:30 p.m. at Island Grove Regional Park. The show, which organizers say will be visible for 10 miles, will be synced to music on the radio, BIG 97.9.

Estes Park will hold the annual Coolest Car Show in Colorado at 10:00–3:00 inside at the Events Complex in Estes Park. Admission is free. The fireworks show will start at 9:30 p.m. over Lake Estes, accessible off of U.S. 34 or U.S. 36.

Independence Day celebrations, including fireworks, are being held in other northern Colorado towns on Saturday, July 2, and Sunday, July 3, including Berthoud, with activities on Sunday afternoon at the new Berthoud Recreation Center and fireworks at 9:15 p.m.

The Colorado Rockies play the Arizona Diamondbacks at 6:10 p.m. on July 2, followed by a fireworks display.

July 4 Anticipated opening date for Old Fall River Road, RMNP. Openings have ranged from June 30 to July 19. The park website does not state the day yet (at mid June). This dirt road really is historic in that the Park built the original road to the summit right here from 1913–1920. Enjoy camera-worthy views; accessible for two-wheel-drive cars.

July 6 Free Day at Denver Botanic Gardens (1007 York St) and Chatfield Farms (8500 W. Deer Creek Canyon Road).

July 8–17 Crested Butte Wildflower Festival. This annual event hosts over 200 workshops, including flower hikes with prices ranging from \$65 to \$175. Specialty categories include sunrise, closeup, and iPhone use. www.crestedbuttewildflowerfestival.org

July 9–Aug 27 39th Annual All Colorado Art Show. Held at Curtis Center for the Arts, 2349 E. Orchard Road, Greenwood Village. It's a highly competitive show for Colorado artists; it can include photography. Hours are Mon-Fri 8:30-4:30, Sat 10-4.

July 11 Worldwide Vintage Autos car show, 4001 Forest St., Denver. More information at 720-370-8835. For more Colorado car shows, use www.coloradocarshow.com

July 13 Super Buck Moon. Following the Supermoon of June, we again enjoy another on this date. This is the closest and largest Supermoon of 2022.

July 28-29 Watch (and shoot) the Delta Aquariids meteor shower around midnight. While this night is the "peak" of the shower, it continues into August. This night is also a New Moon night, so the skies will be fully black.

July 30 Vintage Baseball Game, Belmar Park, 801 S. Yarrow St. in Lakewood. Enjoy seeing & photographing what the old days of baseball were really like. Players in vintage uniforms, playing old rules, plus snacks. Starts at 1 pm; fee is \$4 adults, \$3 kids, under 6 are free. Buy tickets at www.Lakewood.org/Tickets, or call 303-987-7845.
