A Good Photograph

he Loveland Photographic Society meeting for this month will be at the Vineyard Building located at 900 Josephine Court in Loveland. This is located on 11th street between Madison and Boise, just east of the old sugar factory. The club meeting is open to the public and begins at 6:15 with a short business meeting followed by the featured speaker at 6:30 and closing with the monthly photo competition. At the next monthly meeting set for May 12th, three club members will be discussing photography judging.

Most members of a photography club are pretty aware of what constitutes a good photograph. Certainly, each individual, whether a photographer or the average person, has an opinion on any given photo; some will like the image and the next person may not. For most people, there will be times when they like a photo, but, if asked why, they likely will not have a good answer.. they just like it. Well, there is more that goes into "making" a good photograph than is apparent to most non-photographers. Consider composition, which even for many photographers, remains a struggle to master the concepts. There are the ideas of lines and cyclical effects, rules of how to divide scenes, colors and proper contrast, and many more. How about story telling? After looking at a photograph you may feel that you understand a situation more completely, feel the emotion of the event or want to take action based on what you've seen. Certainly emotion plays

a part in any good photograph. Instant sighs, gasps, or wide-eyed reactions to a photograph are a good thing. This instant moment of emotion means the photograph can elicit a response from its viewer. Is a photo that shows no emotion a good photo? A good photo should show vision. Vision is a major effort of the really great photographers. Photographers strive to show everyday things in a new and inventive way. Having creative vision makes a photograph good in the eyes of both the photographer and the viewer. And the list and thoughts go on as to what makes a good photo

A major effort is made by the Loveland club to help members improve their images. This is done through listening to outside speakers, workshops, informal discussions and even through photo competitions. By way of the club competition, LPS is able to not only show the participating photographer but also those in attendance the photos and the judges opinions of the entered photos. This not only helps the photographer improve, but shows others what it takes to produce a "good" image. Should a competing photographer desire a critique "off the record", they can request one. More often than not, judge's opinions are questioned and that is not all bad, but there are criteria given to judges to help them evaluate entered photos. Judging is not easy, but in an effort to help members of the club better understand what a photography judge looks

for in any given photo. The May 12th feature discussion is to hold live judging and have audience participation, then have the more advanced members offer their thoughts to help further the understanding of what makes a "good" photograph. As the saying goes, "you can't get better if you don't know what you are doing wrong". Should be an interesting learning session and one that could be beneficial to many amateurs in the general public who often wonder how they could improve their photos...come take a listen.



oday, I did a photo shoot for a non profit organization in Greeley, the Colorado Therapy Horses. The session brings to mind two diverse thoughts.

The first observation is that video is hard. I was asked to do some video for an event with the horses while another photographer did stills. If you've photographed an event before, you know that, while sometimes challenging, in most cases you have the freedom to move around quickly with your camera, grabbing shots to tell the story. Video? Well, not so much.

To get the highest quality video possible, I shoot from a tripod. Of course, that means it isn't as easy to move from one location to another as it is with a still camera. Also, the camera needs to be leveled each time you set up. In an auditorium, that's not a big issue, but a horse pasture is quite a different story. I found myself struggling to get set up quickly when moving from one place to another. The D800 really helps with this, though, since it has an inclinometer built in to assist in leveling.

Exposure isn't simple, either. Without getting into the details, I shoot with a shutter speed of 1/60 second, which is the best for 30 frames per second HD video. Well, a 60th of a second in bright sun means a really tiny aperture. However, I want to take advantage of the shallow depth of field of wider apertures. That means using neutral density filters. Since I only have one set of ND filters, I have to change them whenever I change lenses. I need to fix that with more ND filters so lens changes are less of a production. I also shoot in manual for video to make sure I get the exposure parameters I want. I don't let the camera make any decisions for me. And, it's not just video when you say "video". Of

course, you probably need some sound to go along with it. This morning we were dealing with big trucks going by on the country road next to the pasture and airplanes and helicopters going right over us on the way to and from the Greeley airport. Fortunately, for this product, we'll overdub some audio onto the video so we won't have to use much of the audio captured today.

Now that the session is "in the can" (why do we still use film terms with digital photography??), I can work on post processing. I now have 74 video clips that are between eight seconds and about two minutes long. The goal will be for a product that's probably something between one and three minutes long that will go on a website or be presented to possible sponsors. It's not as simple as hitting "P" in Lightroom to select the images you want to give to a client. It will take hours (for me, anyway) to put together a show that tells a story with good quality video. Then we'll have to write a script for the audio and get that recorded.

So, my challenge to you this month is to try doing a purely video shoot. Most of our cameras these days will shoot video, so give it a try. I'd like to hear your comments after you try video on the LPS Facebook group. If there's any interest in a video SIG, let me know. The Fort Collins club has started one, so take advantage of that if you are a member there.

My second observation is that there are a lot of worthy non profit groups out there who need the services of good photographers, but who don't have the money to pay for them. LPS member, Jim Dow, has done lots of work for the Larimer Humane Society. Jim and his wife, Kathy, do a weekly session to photograph animals looking for a new forever home for the LHS website. I

know they find it to be a rewarding experience. I've done several sessions for them for events, their annual report, and other projects. If you get a chance to use your photographic skills to help someone like veterans groups or other worthy organizations, give it a try. In most cases, it will be a very rewarding experience.

- Two-dimensional entry size is limited to a maximum of 34" x 44" framed (outside frame), or 78 united inches (length plus width).
- Artists submitting three-dimensional entries must contact Colette Pitcher at the Showcase Art Center in Greeley (970) 356-8593.
 - No early removal of artwork from the display.

Entry:

A nonrefundable entry fee is charged for up to 3 juried pieces:

- \$15 for NCHL members
- \$25 for non-members

Additional works up to 6 for \$10 each.

Please make checks payable to: The Art Department. Work must be delivered to Michener Library on the UNC campus on Saturday, August 23 between 3:00 and 5:00 PM. Artists are invited to provide a one-page artist's statement/resume to be included in the show notebook. A signed statement of place and date of creation/inspiration must accompany all works.

Reception:

A reception for artists and the public is on Friday, September 5 from 4-6 PM at the Mari Michener Gallery in Michener Library on the UNC campus.

Awards:

Ribbons and cash prizes will be awarded in Painting, Photography, and 3-dimensional work.

Unsold Entries:

Pick up unsold entries on Saturday, September 27th, between 10:30 AM-12:00 noon. Unclaimed art will be subject to a \$5.00/day per item transportation and storage fee.

Liability:

Work not properly presented will not be accepted.

Sales:

A 30% total commission will be assessed on all sales.




