The photo review session allows up to three images — title the images with the letters A, B and C followed by your last name. This will allow us to limit the number of images if it is necessary.

The Dynamics of Forms, Patterns and Texture

One way to create a vibrant photograph is by making images that have a form, pattern or texture.

Discovering patterns. Patterns are made up of repeated objects, shapes or color. They represent order and harmony. Patterns abounding everywhere, the only thing that is necessary to do is to choose the right viewpoint. By carefully selecting the camera position it is possible to record beautiful patterns even when looking at a seemingly array of the subject's elements.

Revealing texture. The appearance of texture in a photograph gives the viewer additional information about the tactile qualities of an object. Texture conveys how the subject feels, either hard, or soft, smooth or rough. It is normally a two-dimensional shape. Images with texture can become the subject of an exceptional photograph.

Revealing Form. Whereas texture describes the two-dimensional outline of a subject, a form adds a strong sense of realism to photographs, because it appeals directly to our sense of touch. When we look at a photograph of ropes and buoys, we respond to the tangible qualities of these objects and get a sense of three-dimensionality. By giving this impression of solidity, texture helps us sense the weight and bulk of an object as well as its softness or hardness, its coarseness or smoothness.

Please keep the judging criteria in mind:

Impact and Viewer Interest — "Wow" factor is the nebulous quality where an image "pops". This subjective aspect of judging should not preempt the technical or composition aspects of an image.

Composition — Good composition is a pleasing arrangement of the elements in an image. There are many guidelines for good composition that judges may consider.

Technical Quality — This includes sharpness, focus, color, tonal scale, contrast, appropriate depth of field and other qualities. Consideration is also given for the effect the photographer was trying to achieve such as high key, multiple exposure, selective focus, etc.

Monthly Themes — The subject matter should be related in some manner to the theme. While there are no formal "deductions" or penalties, judges may reduce their overall score if they feel the image does not align with monthly theme. With that said, creative interpretation is encouraged.

Save Raw Editor Settings

A major feature in Lightroom for me is the ability to copy adjustments made to one photo and apply those settings to other photos. The same thing can be done in Photoshop — sort of.

Once you've made your adjustments in the raw editor, click on the menu icon just to the right of where it says "Basic."


Save Settings...

Name the XMP file (anything you want).

Important — save the settings before opening the image and leaving the raw editor, or it's too late. When you call up your next photo, and get into the raw editor, click on the same menu icon:

Load Settings...

Select the XMP file you just saved with the first image — boom! The adjustments you made to the first photo are applied to the current photo.


