

Submitting Pictures for the Monthly Competition or Photo Review Session

- Log on to the LPS.CC website
- Mouse over the **Competitions** dropdown on the Home Page.
- Select menu item:

Submit images to a Competition

- Select the Competition category or the Third Monday Photo Review
- At the bottom of the screen, click on **Upload images into the Competition.**
- Then click on the button Select which will open a window on your computer to select an image.
- Click on Save Images and Proceed to Edit Page.
- Type in a title and click on Save any changes and return to original page.
- You can replace any photo, up to the submission deadline, if desired.

The monthly competitions allow a single image per category. The photo review session allows up to three images. Include your last name in the title; this will allow us to limit the number of images if it is necessary.

Competition Corner

March Competition

Open Projected Nature Projected Monthly Topic: Minimalist

Submission Deadline

Before Midnight, Monday, March 1

Please keep the judging criteria in mind:

Impact and Viewer Interest—"Wow" factor is the nebulous quality where an image "pops." This subjective aspect of judging should not preempt the technical or composition aspects of an image.

Composition—Good composition is a pleasing arrangement of the elements in an image. There are many guidelines for good composition that judges may consider.

Technical Quality—This includes sharpness, focus, color, tonal scale, contrast, appropriate depth of field and other qualities. Consideration is also given for the effect the photographer was trying to achieve such as high key, multiple exposure, or selective focus.

Monthly Topics—The subject matter should be related in some manner to the topic. While there are no formal deductions or penalties, judges may reduce their overall score if they feel the image does not align with the monthly topic. With that said, creative interpretation is encouraged.

Open Projected—The image must begin as a photograph. From there, it is up to you. Any photograph may be entered in the Open Projected category.

Minimalism in Photography

Minimalism, as with any form of art, is open to interpretation, and the approach to minimalistic photography will differ from person to person. The heart of minimalism is simplicity rather than complexity. Thus, although a minimalistic image might be black and white with a single object in one corner (yes, that is certainly minimal and can be very effective), a different form of minimalism might feature the restraint of one main color or a single contrasting color or might use repetitive lines as the story or might merely be suggestive of a shape. The main point is a thoughtful lack of clutter.

As with all of our Monthly Topic competition category themes, this is an opportunity to challenge yourself to work to a specific guideline and perhaps experiment with a style of photography that is outside your comfort zone!

Nature Category

A reminder, these digital adjustments are allowed:

- Adjust exposure
- Adjust highlight and shadow detail
- Adjust contrast
- Correct white balance/color
- Convert to black & white (grayscale only)
- Adjust saturation
- Remove dust spots, noise, flares
- Crop, straighten
- Sharpen (including focus layering)

Adjustments must appear natural.

Not allowed:

- · Cloning anything in or out
- Intentional (post process) background blurring

J.R. Schnelzer to Serve as President of PSA Board

A slate of candidates for the Photographic Society of America Board of Directors were elected by written ballot for the 2021-2023 term. Long-time LPS member and past president J.R. Schnelzer, FPSA, EPSA, AFIAP, who has been serving as executive vice president of PSA, has been elected as the president of the Board; the new Board will assume office at the conclusion of PSA's Photo Festival which is scheduled to be held in Rapid City, South Dakota, October 6-9, 2021. Apparently there was no controversy over the not-in-person ballot count!

Ruth Sprain Featured in PSA Journal Article

The February 2021 issue of the *PSA Journal* includes a full-length article on LPS member Ruth Sprain, who serves as our club's volunteer to coordinate the PSA Youth Showcase entries for LPS. Ruth is beginning her fifth year as a member of the PSA Greenhood Scholarship Committee. Over the years PSA has worked with a number of organizations for higher learning, and today collaborates with the University of Central Oklahoma to identify and reward students who are in their third year of study and are majoring in photography.

LPS Judges Round 2 of PSA Competition

Round 2 of the PSA Nature Division Interclub competition was completed on February 15, and LPS was the host club charged with judging entries for Group B. Since LPS competes in Group A, none of the photographs being judged were taken by members of our club. The three-judge panel consisted of J.R. Schnelzer, Ruth Sprain, and Jeanie Sumrall-Ajero; Lorie Smith served as the tabulator, with Ardeth Carlson as the supervisor.

In Group B, there were 145 images from 24 clubs, and each judge awarded a score of 1-5. The three scores were then added for a final total score. Merit and honorable mention awards were given for the top 20% of the images. Per this year's new judging guidelines, images that were noted to have an infraction (something designated as unacceptable in PSA nature competition photography) received a 1, rather than being disqualified, as in previous PSA judging guidelines.

The LPS panel marked 10 images for infractions, such as intentional background blurring, domesticated animal, cultivated flower, and suspected composite. In determining suspected composites, the judges closely examined the photograph for unusual cutoffs/edges/haloing, lack of shadow where the lighting indicated there should be a shadow, and lack of logical ripples in a water reflection. For members who participate in nature competitions, this indicates the thoroughness of the judges in trying to determine photographs that were manipulated in a manner that does not fit the rules, and in some cases all three judges did not agree that there was an infraction but might still give a low score for other reasons.

PSA has approved an updated "A Guide for Nature Photography Judges 2020." This 19-page document thoroughly explains the definition of nature photography, policy on aerial photography, acceptable and unacceptable subjects, storytelling character, and technical aspects, with numerous examples. In considering entries for nature competition, here are some of the violations that are easy to miss:

- Road/vehicle tracks/path/trail
- Fences/fence posts
- Signs
- Power poles and wires
- Vehicles
- Walls or parts of walls
- Mowing and plowing patterns
- Cut tree stumps, cut-off limbs, branches or stems
- Jesses & thongs on bird's legs (differs from scientific banding)
- Domestic animal
- Cultivated/hybrid plant

However, there are some exceptions that are noted in the guidelines.

For photographers who are interested in competing in the nature category, this is well worth the read. Although some rules of nature photography might seem overly strict, competitive nature photography is intended to recognize photographers who capture the natural world as it exists rather than photographers who post-process images such that they no longer reflect what is real. It can also be noted that today's urban/suburban creep makes it more and more difficult to avoid many of the violations noted above!

PSA Interclub Competitions

LPS is a member club of the Photographic Society of America and participates in three divisions of interclub competition: nature, print, and travel. There are three rounds of competition per season, with deadlines on November 15, February 15, and April 15.

For the **nature and travel divisions**, each club can submit up to six images by six different members in each round. Photos should be in JPG format with dimensions of horizontal no greater than 1400 pixels and vertical no greater than 1050 pixels.

In the **pictorial print division**, there are five image categories: large color, small color, large mono, small mono, and creative altered reality. Participating clubs can submit up to four prints by four different members in each category at each round.

The LPS reps are reaching out to members whose images they have noted in LPS competitions as well as in social media like Facebook but also welcome submissions by all members of the club. Photographers who are members of more than one club can only submit a specific image for one of the clubs.

LPS members who are interested in having their photos considered for our club's submissions to a PSA interclub competition can contact the LPS rep for more details.

The club reps will notify you when they use one of your photos for our entries in a round, and you will be asked to sign and return a consent form allowing your photo to be posted on the PSA website. This is not required for entry but is required if you win an award and want your photo to be displayed online. This form is in effect for three years, but a separate consent is required for each of the three divisions.

Entry Closed for 2021 National Fine Art Show

The Lincoln Gallery in downtown Loveland has announced that due to the high volume of entries for the 2021 National Fine Art Show which they are hosting, they are no longer accepting photography submissions. PSA Interclub Competition Round 3

No Reservations Required in RMNP IN 2021

This year Rocky Mountain National Park officials will not be using the advanced-registrations system for entry to the park that they used last year. From the Loveland Reporter-Herald: "At this time, we do not plan to implement the same type of timed-entry permit system as was used in 2020, but will continue restrictions when necessary and may implement other pilot visitor management techniques if congestion and crowding warrants,' said Kyle Patterson, the park's public affairs officer." There have already been restrictions to alleviate vehicle congestion in specific areas of the park since 2016.
